Spanning Time Addendum: There is an addendum now available to *Spanning Time – Vermont's Covered Bridges* by Joe Nelson. This 36-page addendum follows the layout and provides updates to the contents of Joe's 1997 book. New information has been added and lost bridges have been deleted.

The VCBS website is in the process of adding a new feature: a Combined Covered Bridges tour. Over the years there have been questions about bridges not being found on our covered map. These are typically the non-traditional or "romantic shelter" bridges. To solve this dilemma, I am working on a new project that will merge all the covered bridge types into a combined tour. This

will hopefully answer questions that have come up in the past.

Saturday, September 28, 2024, found VCBS members at the Warren Town Hall for our Fall Meeting. John Knox captured a fabulous photo of the group! Total expenses: \$378.00. Income from lunch donations, merch sales, and the teacup auction: \$409.00. Members were afforded the opportunity to order T-shirts with the VCBS 25th year logo. These were mailed in early November (37 sold), and I hope to see many being worn at the Spring 2025 VCBS Meeting!

Publicity Committee

We've had several great opportunities in the last few months to publicize the work the Vermont Covered Bridge Society does.

In October, Beth Brown Limmer and I sat for a taping of "Across the Fence". This is a daily 15-minute television program co-produced by University of Vermont Extension and WCAX-TV Channel 3. We were interviewed by Joleil Whitney regarding our involvement in the VCBS and what the VCBS does to help save Vermont's Covered Bridges. The original segment aired on 11-6-24. In November, Beth Brown Limmer, Scott Scribner and I also sat for a video/podcast taping on Okemo Valley TV. Again, discussing the VCBS and what we are doing to help preserve Vermont's Covered Bridges. Finally, on December 3rd, I spoke to a lunch group at Main Street Arts in Saxtons River regarding Vermont's Covered Bridges. It was an enjoyable session where I learned a thing or two from the group as well as providing information on Covered Bridge construction, the builders and a virtual tour of the local covered bridges.

Bridge Watch/Bridges in the news

Henry Covered Bridge – reported by Life Member Tom Carpenter

"I was in Bennington VT yesterday (11-15-24) to check out the three bridges there. When I got to the Henry Bridge (VT-45-02-02#2) I was unable to cross the bridge. Three workers were laying down a new floor using 2X8 pressure treated boards. They were in the process of laying down the boards to cover the complete floor from side to side and end to end. I thought I would let you know about this for "The Bridger" "Bridge Watch/Bridges in the news" should you want to make other members aware of this."

Halls Covered Bridge – Rockingham, Gorham and Depot Covered Bridges - Pittsford & Proctor

The Vermont Covered Bridge Society has offered to provide fire retardant to these 3 bridges with a grant from the National Society for the Preservation of Covered Bridges. The towns have not responded to the offer at this time

Sanderson Covered Bridge – Brandon

The Sanderson Covered Bridge was unfortunately struck twice during the last couple of months. The first time was on 10-4-24 when the bridge was struck by an 18-wheeler. The vehicle was found to be about 20,000

pounds overweight and had other equipment deficiencies. The driver from Ontario Canada was ticketed. The bridge was temporarily closed while our Bridge Watch Committee Chairman, Miles Jenness, went to assess the damage. He is a big timber specialist and has worked on many covered bridges. Miles was able to determine that the Sanderson Covered Bridge could be safely reopened to traffic. The quote for repairs was \$24,500.

On November 26, 2024, the Sanderson Covered Bridge was hit again, this time on the opposite portal. The driver left the scene, ran over a mailbox, and forced an off-duty firefighter and his 2 children off the road. Police were able to catch up with the driver from Pittsburg, Pennsylvania who was arrested, and cited for one count of negligent vehicle operation and two counts of leaving the scene of a crash with property damage resulting. He was also issued tickets for driving over a bridge weight limit and failure to obey traffic devices. According to police, “there were five signs there, and he just drove straight by them. He just disregarded all of them and struck the bridge.” The truck was 2 feet taller than the covered bridge’s clearance causing damage to the bridge’s roof and its supports. Damages for this second hit were estimated between \$25,000 and \$50,000. The bridge is currently passable.

Taftsville Covered Bridge – Woodstock

A flat bed tow truck with full sized camper van on it clipped the front of the bridge and dragged the van across every beam.

Waitsfield (Great Eddy) Covered Bridge - Waitsfield

On November 19, 2024 a driver thought he could fit through the Waitsfield Covered Bridge even though the

truck was 2 feet tall than the covered bridge’s clearance. The result was damage to the bridge’s roof and its supports. The truck also exceeded the 3-ton weight limit on the bridge.

Miles Jenness has put together a proposal to fix the damage the truck caused as well as address some prior issues.

Miller’s Run Covered Bridge - Lyndonville
 Progress is being made on the Miller’s Run Covered Bridge in Lyndonville. Foundations for the 2 metal headache bars on either side of the bridge entrance have been poured and are awaiting installation of the steel barriers for this \$40,000 project.

Directors Spotlight

For the newsletter, I wanted to add a director's spotlight so members who haven't yet met our board would have a chance to get to know a little about them. In this edition, I'm pleased to bring you Joe Nelson, current President of the Vermont Covered Bridge Society.

I met with Joe on a sunny Friday at his home in Underhill Vermont accompanied by Beth Brown Limmer. I had only met Joe a couple of other times so this was also an opportunity to get to know him a little more. Over the span of a couple of hours, I was able to worm some details out of his life.

Joe was born in Beacon, New York and subsequently grew up in Poughkeepsie. As a youth, Joe would work at his uncle's dairy farm building his muscles throwing bales of hay. In addition to farming, Joe's uncle also used to train boxers and gave Joe a few tips. In Poughkeepsie, Joe was a newcomer and taunted by the other boys. After one of the boys' older brothers tried to bully him, Joe took a punch in the head, looked the bully in the eyes and took him out with a single punch. He was left alone after that.

As a youth, Joe also sailed the Hudson River on a Friendship Sloop that he and his friends rescued and restored from under a farmer's porch. Joe told me stories of camping on the river from the sloop and running the waves to beat it through an extremely narrow opening into an inner waterway off the river. His friends were equally amazed when he undauntedly took them back through the opening out into the river.

This perseverance worked well for Joe. After graduating from college, Joe went to work for IBM, where he climbed the corporate ladder, transferred to Essex Junction in Vermont and then retired after putting in 31 years.

After working 12-14 hours a day in the office, Joe realized he didn't really know who his neighbors were or even much about his new home state of Vermont. So, he and his wife Ruth decided to explore the towns of Vermont. That is where he discovered covered bridges.

It was at the Gates Farm Covered Bridge where Joe really got into the nuts and bolts of covered bridges. This small bridge at Cambridge Junction had been moved from route 15 to a new location at Gates Farm and needed extensive repair work. Joe spent many days tagging along with the Blow and Cote crew who were working on the bridge and talking with them during lunch to learn how the covered bridges were built. He asked tons of questions that he used to get information for his book *Spanning Time – Vermont's Covered Bridges*. He said it helped that he wore his construction costume consisting of helmet, hard-toed shoes and jacket to fit in with the crew.

To round off his book, Joe spent about a year diving into the stacks of information in the library at Montpelier. The State of Vermont had asked historians to write the history of the towns of Vermont and Joe devoured that information focusing on the towns with covered bridges. If you read *Spanning Time*, you'll find evidence of this with some of the stories he included such as "Ann Story's Cave", "Joe's Pond" and "Ethan Allen and the Guilford Yorkers" just to name a few. In 2000, Bill "Liam" McKone approached some of the living authors of covered bridge books, including Joe and Ed Barna, to help save the big bridge at Cambridge

Junction. Through their work, and along with others such as Terry Shaw, the bridge was saved, and the Vermont Covered Bridge Society came into existence. Joe was instrumental in creating the constitution and the bylaws for the society, providing organization and served multiple roles through the last 24+ years in the society including newsletter editor and President.

When asked if he had a favorite covered bridge, his reply was the Salisbury Station also known as the Cedar Swamp. This Town lattice truss bridge, built in 1864-1865, was destroyed by fire in September of 2016. Hopefully, it will be rebuilt as Joe remembers.

I asked Joe what he would like to say to members and prospective members of the Vermont Covered Bridge Society. His response was to think about why the bridges are there. Why are they where they are? Do you understand the role the covered bridges played –

their importance and history in the growth of the State of Vermont? If you look around the bridges, you will see the ruins of the industry that the bridges were built to support. That is the history that we in the Society are working to save.

Joe will be stepping down as the President of the Vermont Covered Bridge Society at the end of the year. But that doesn't mean he is going to be idle. He has 4 books ready to go to the publishers with other ideas in the offing.

Thanks, Joe, for all you've done for the Vermont Covered Bridge Society and for helping save Vermont's remaining covered bridges. I had a great time talking with him and listening to his stories and hope to hear more from him.

Our annual Fall meeting was held in Warren, VT on September 28, 2024. There were 19 individuals in attendance from VT, NH, MD, NJ & TX. Beth Brown Limmer presented a framed poster signed by attendees of the Kingsley Covered Bridge opening to Bob Underhill of the Clarendon Historical Society

Meeting called to order by Vice-President Steve Miyamoto at 10:43am.

II. Officer's Reports

MINUTES

Minutes from the June 8, 2024 meeting had been previously distributed so they were not read out to the attendees. Copies were also available for review. Motion to approve and seconded June 8, 2024 meeting minutes.

Treasurer's Report

Treasure Dan Monger was not in attendance but submitted his report.

- Highlights of the report were read out by Secretary Mark Maddox.
- Beth mentioned that there is \$450 that is not reflected in the report due to calendars that Liam has sold.
- Motion to approve and seconded with that caveat.

III. Committee Reports

Bridge Watch Committee

Chair Miles Jenness was unable to attend

- Steve gave an update on the Cambridge Junction Bridge from the September 19th edition of the Mountain Gazette.
 - Permits have delayed work
 - Abutments need to be fixed, but open to pedestrians
 - Marcel brought pictures of the work that is being done.
 - Downriver side of the bridge is being worked on
- Steve Brown mentioned tree damage to the Scott Covered bridge that was noticed last week.
- Beth reported on the River Road bridge in Troy that was burned in February 2021. Federal government will fund 100%.
 - Steve read a comment that the bridge will be replaced as a Covered Bridge.
- Salisbury Station Bridge is not currently on the list of bridges to be rebuilt. It was lost in 2016. The public wants it replaced with an authentic covered bridge.
- Millers Run Bridge - concrete being installed for the headache bar.
- Judy reported on visiting the Montgomery bridges. She was unable to reach the Hutchins Covered Bridge due to a tree blocking the road on the only way in. (Note: Mark visited the Hutchins Covered Bridge on 9-29 and the tree had been cleared)
- The group discussed the cost of rebuilding a covered bridge vs constructing a modern bridge. Though not completely certain the feeling is the costs are comparable.

Events and Fundraising Committee

Report submitted by Beth Brown Limmer, Event Committee Chair and Fundraising Committee Acting Chair

- On the heels of the September issue of The Bridger, in which the news of our activities from Spring 2024 Meeting until late August was shared, came the busy month of September.
 - On Sat. September 14, 2024, VCBS had a booth at the 12th annual Golden Honey Festival in Proctorsville, VT. This was held on the grounds of the Golden Stage Inn on an 84 degree day! Paul and I were busy from 9 to 4 and net gain to VCBS was \$269.40. The \$40 vendor fee was a bit high, I thought, for a one day event, but the owners of the inn donate all vendor fees to a local community group doing great things in that little town. So it's all good.
 - The following week, Sept 21 & 22, found us at Chester Festival for the second year. As you may recall, this was a hugely successful selling event for VCBS in 2023. This year surpassed last year in several aspects:
 - MUCH more help (Thanks to Mark Maddox, Scott and Barbara Scribner, Jeanne and Marcel Beaudry, and Paul Limmer),
 - Better net gain than 2023 (i.e.\$1,073.43),
 - Two new couples, 1 individual, and 1 life individual members were gained.
 - Win – win – win! The weather was perfect and the crowd was massive both days. This is a “must-do” event in 2025.
 - So, what's next? Well, the meeting in Warren on 9/28/24. I have a Teacup Raffle organized. Raffle tickets (\$1.00 each) will be sold and the proceeds used to defray the cost of the meeting venue. I thank you for your donations towards lunch / meeting costs. This formula of free-will donations and either a Silent Auction or Raffle works! The Spring Meeting in Charlotte on 6/8/24 was entirely covered, including the \$75 donation made to Charlotte 4-H, except for \$30.00. My EC budget and I extend deep gratitude to you, the meeting attendees.
 - We have a few more sales events on tap before the year ends. There is an Air Stream rally in Brandon this weekend. The Scribners will take a few items of VCBS merchandise, including the

- newly acquired (as in on 9/26!) jigsaw puzzle featuring Vermont covered bridges.
- The Pittsford Craft Fair (to benefit Pittsford Christmas Child Fund) will be held Sat. Nov 23 at Lothrop School. This is our third year as vendor there.
- Then, lastly, Moonlight Madness is happening again in Brandon in early December. Last year was the first year for us, and Barbara Scribner captured a spot in Brandon Town Hall at the very last moment.
- You may wonder what all our fairs, festivals, and farmers market appearances have netted thus far in 2024. If you don't, then stop reading. But if you do want to know, by my figures, VCBS is \$2,521.61 richer than we were at the 6/8/24 Spring Meeting. This is from person-to-person sales at events only. It does not include calendar sales
 - outside of events or sales from the online store / marketplace.

 - Workers doing the just completed restoration believe the bridge is older than 1870.
 - Bob has done research and found that records do not show a bridge construction during the 1870-time frame (+/- 5 years). Bob believes that the bridge is older than 1870.
- Afternoon bridge caravan will visit the Warren, Waitsfield and Pine Brook Covered Bridges.
- National Society for the Preservation of Covered Bridges annual meeting will be held in North Grafton, MA on October 26, 2024.

 - *Whereas*, the Vermont Covered Bridge Society has grown from its inception by a handful of Vermonters to a membership of over 300 bridge enthusiasts from the United States and Canada, and,
 - *Whereas*, VCBS will celebrate its 25th anniversary as a non-profit organization in Vermont in 2025 and is manned solely by volunteers, and,
- *Whereas*, a relationship of cooperation and collaboration with Vermont State agencies, especially the Agency of Transportation, has been built, and,
- *Whereas*, residents and tourists consider covered bridges to be an important part of the tapestry of Vermont culture,
- *Let it now be proclaimed*, the first Saturday of August of each year will be recognized as Vermont Covered Bridge Day, and feted as such, and,
- *Furthermore*, celebrations of Vermont Covered Bridge Society's 25th anniversary will take place throughout Vermont during 2025, and include displays of covered bridge models, photography, and art within State buildings and highway rest areas.
